DEAN POUND EDITS WORK.

New Collection of Readings on Roman Law Just Out.

Dean Roscoe Pound has just edited a new colection of translated readings on the Roman law. It embraces extracts from the "Institutes" of Justinian; Cicero, "Topico;" Erskine, Principles of the Law of Scotland, and extended quotations from Sohm, Ihering, Salkowski, Dernburg, Wachter and other jurists. The work comes from the press of a Lincoln publishing house.
