DEAN POUND EDITS WORK.

New Collection of Readings on Roman
 Law Just Out.

Dean Roscoe Pound has just edited
 a new collection of translated readings
 on the Roman law. It embraces ex-
 tracts from the "Institutes" of Jus-
 tinian; Cicero, "Topico;" Erskine,
 Principles of the Law of Scotland,
 and extended quotations from Sohm,
 Ihering, Salkowski, Dernburg, Wach-
 ter and other jurists. The work comes
 from the press of a Lincoln publish-
 ing house. It will give a new impetus
 to the study of Roman law, as indeed
 it fills a large gap in the library of the
 law student. The publication has
 become necessary from the needs of
 class-room work.

The Dean of the College of Law is
 also in receipt of a magnificent library
 of the works of foreign jurists, im-
 ported from Germany. The books are
 quite largely in German, and from the
 standpoint of technique alone are fine
 examples of the printer's art.
