NEBRASKANS TO THE FORE.

University Engineers in High Favor With the Westinghouse Company.
"Nebraska men are in high favor with the Westinghouse people, probably the highest." This is the statement made by Fred P. Rawson, one of the special apprentices sent by the University to Pittsburg last year, relative to the standing of Nebraskan engineers in the "smoky city."
"There are men from Columbia, Cornell, Wisconsin, Armour Institute, Perdue—in fact, from every engineering school in the country, but none stand a better show than those from the University of Nebraska. The company likes men who will get down and dig, men who study like the 'Varsity plays football—no giving up. This quality it thinks the men from the west, particularly Nebraska, have in abundance."

When asked how the University colony was getting on, Mr. Rawson said that, with the exception of Jesse Gibbs, '05, who has been confined to his home in Nashville, Tennessee, with typhoid fever since July, every Nebraskan is doing fine.
Mr. Rawson is visiting with University friends this week prior to accepting a position with the Westinghouse company in Chicago the 10th of November.
