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**VESUVIUS AND POMPEII.**

Professor Barber Gives Interesting Talk at Convocation.

Prof. G. E. Barber gave an interesting and instructive illustrated lecture on "Mount Vesuvius and Pompeii" at Convocation yesterday morning. Mount Vesuvius, he said, is the most celebrated volcano in the world and attracts many people to Naples. There are now 800,000 people living within range of its many dangers of lava, sand, dust and falling stones. The worse eruption since the terrible one of 79 A. D. was in 1631, and at this time one hundred and fifty speeches, essays and poems were written, which is another reason for making Vesuvius famous.

A mistaken idea is held concerning the smoke, flames and ashes of the volcano; the smoke being the steam, gas or vapor from the interior, the flames merely the reflection of the heat below and the ashes are only fine dust and sand. Pompeii was destroyed not by lava, but by sand and ashes, and Herculaneum was buried by a mud stream, later making solid stone over this ancient city. Below the crater at the base of the cone is an observatory, and here Professor Mattenoci has made some wonderful observations. Vesuvius is never absolutely quiet, but often exceedingly violent, averaging so about every twenty-two years. The cable railroad running up the steepest incline to the top, is now very little used. In violent eruptions columns of steam have risen thousands of feet above the mountain, and dust was carried as far as Constantinople and Paris.

The views which Professor Barber had were exceedingly clear and good, showing remains of Pompeii and Herculaneum. These included bronze utensils, vases, pitchers, oil jars, door knockers and handles, chandeliers erected on posts, lamps and paintings.

In one of the old bakeries or mills were found some round loaves of bread which were baked over 1800 years ago and are now preserved in the National Museum at Naples.
