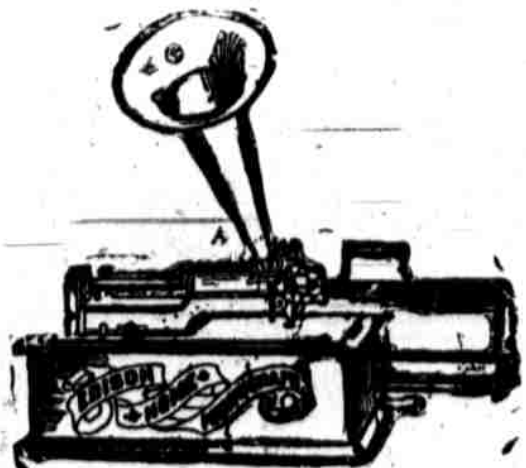

of Scientific Investigation," Macaulay's

and Jowett's "The Causes of Failure."
3. Burke's "The American Love of
Freedom."

4. Lectures on exposition and on
method of making an outline and de-
termining paragraphs.

5. All other matters taken up in the
classroom.
