**Botany Changes.**

It has been arranged to give up botanical rooms 108 and 110 in Nebraska Hall for the use of the State Horticultural Society for their annual meeting, January 15, 16 and 17. The meetings for papers will be held in the lecture room (110), while the laboratory tables will be used for the display of apples. Lectures and laboratory work in General Botany will be suspended for these three days, but will continue without interruption for all other classes. Laboratory work will be resumed as usual on Friday, the 18th. For many years the Horticultural Society used to meet in the botanical rooms, but two or three years ago they began to meet at the Farm. They have concluded now to come back to the campus again, greatly to the delight of the botanical students, who "smell apples."

**Dr. Bessey Not Going to Florida.**

Contrary to the reports in the daily papers, Dr. Bessey is not going to Baton Rouge, La., to read a paper, nor is he going from there to Florida, as the papers say. He proposes to stay by his classes until the holidays, when he is planning to go to New York to attend some botanical meetings, and at their close he hopes to take a run down into Florida to see the country and the people, and incidentally to do some collecting of sub-tropical seaweed.

Chancellor Andrews left yesterday for Fullerton, where he delivered a speech last night. Tonight he will deliver an address before the Palladian Society and one later in the evening in one of the churches in the city. After this he takes the train for Baton Rouge, La., where he will attend the scientific and educational conventions which will be held there next week. Many of the faculty will be in attendance.

Prof. A. S. Johnson of the department of Political Economy and Commerce has received an invitation from the department of Economics of the University of Wisconsin to give a number of lectures there on various general and special subjects. If able to accept, Professor Johnson will spend a few days there directly after the Christmas holidays.

Students in Economic Geology, having completed a study of the leading sandstones and limestones in the United States, are now working on the sands and gravels of Nebraska. Each student must sample and identify at least sands, and also be able to describe all building stones of economic importance in the state.

Mr. A. E. Sheldon of the State Historical Society, is collecting and arranging a complete set of pamphlet laws from the different states and territories for the use of members of the legislature. The subjects which these laws cover are: Insurance, railroads, corporations, schools, game, roads and revenues.
