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A LACK OF CO-OPERATION.

Within the last few days there have appeared several indications that there is a lack of co-operation between certain members of the University faculty that is not only an inconvenience to the students of the institution, but a decided check to the welfare of the University as well.

The spirit that underlies the slight friction that has been caused is apparently the unwillingness of one department or instructor to give way to another, regardless of how valid the demand may be. One instructor, it seems, intends to give a mid-semester examination on a certain day this week and it has developed that one of her students is expected by another instructor to go on a class excursion which will take the entire day as-

tainly to be deplored. Petty selfishness or a personal grudge can be the only reason for so small an action on the part of a member of the faculty. To take advantage of one's official position or the technicality of a University regulation to carry out personal spite or to avoid a bit of extra work, when the cause is legitimate, appeals to us as conduct unworthy of any University instructor and decidedly detrimental to the cause of higher education.

We believe that every instructor in the University, regardless of his rank or his lack of rank, should work in harmony with every other instructor. We are all bound together in one University and we all have, or should have, one general aim: the bettering of our institution and the extension of its influence. Plainly, dissension, or even a mere lack of harmony, among the faculty, will in no way aid the cause.

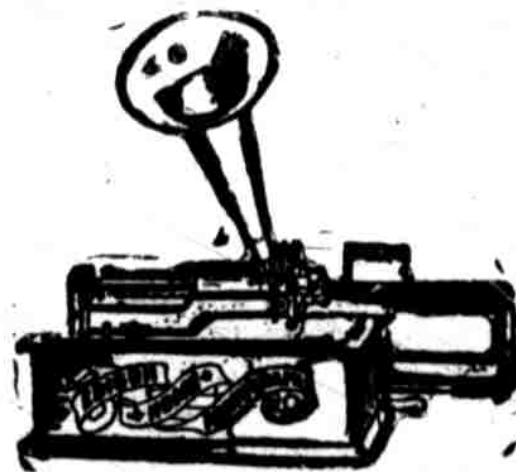
