PROGRESS ON THE BONES.

Critical Study Being Made of Remains of Prehistoric Man.

Prof. E. H. Barbour, Prof. G. E. Condra, and Mr. A. B. Sheldon all went to Omaha Saturday to investigate further the prehistoric mound north of that city. More bones were found which further supplement the valuable discoveries already made. Three shaft-like holes were sunk to a depth of eight feet and all earth thus removed was examined carefully. Necessarily work so carefully conducted proceeds slowly. Eventually the mound will be thoroly stripped.

More careful examination of these remains only tend to show they are still older than was before believed.

Numerous articles concerning them are being prepared for various magazines. Prof. E. H. Barbour is preparing an article in response to a request from "Putnam's."

Undoubtedly the "Nebraska Loess Man," as the remains are called, will cause much discussion in scientific circles for some time.
