DR. PAINE TO COOK.

Will Superintend Production of Second Y. M. C. A. Dinner.  
The social committee of the Y. M. C. A. announces that Dr. B. L. Paine, who is well known in University circles, has consented to be chef for the second of a series of suppers given by the Association to University men, which will come off next Saturday evening, December 8, at six o'clock in the basement of St. Paul's church.  
The success of the first of these suppers has led the management to plan for a series thruout the winter and these plans will be carried out to the limit if the supper of the coming Saturday receives sufficient patronage. The menu for the coming feast includes spring chicken, dumplings, the best of gravy, and biscuits that will make good air-ships.  
The announcement that Dr. B. L. Paine will preside over the kitchen and have charge of cooking the entire meal, comes as a glad surprise to all who are acquainted with Dr. Paine's ability as a culinary artist. The young men of the University who have had the good fortune to attend one of Dr. Paine's famous "feeds" will all testify that he is a cook of extraordinary ability and can produce a meal which would put to shame those attempted by the Lincoln and Lindell Hotels, or even by the Domestic Science girls. For years past the doctor has been in the habit of entertaining as many University young men as possible at these "feeds," and the social committee is to be congratulated in securing his services.  
The price of the dinner will be 15 cents and all University young men are urged to purchase tickets early, so that the committee may know how many to provide for.

NOBEL PEACE PRIZE.

Announcement Relative to Proposal of Candidates Reaches University.

The Nobel committee of the Norwegian Parliament has issued the following announcement relative to the awarding of Nobel prizes in 1907:

All proposals of candidates for the Nobel Peace Prize, which is to be distributed December 10th, 1907, must, in order to be taken into consideration, be laid before the Nobel committee of the Norwegian Parliament by a duly qualified person before the first of February of the same year.

Any one of the following persons is held to be duly qualified: (a) Members and late members of the Nobel committee of the Norwegian Parliament, as well as the advisers appointed at the Norwegian Nobel Institute; (b) members of Parliament and members of government of the different states, as well as members of the Interparliamentary Union; (c) members of the International Arbitration Court at The Hague; (d) members of the Commission of the Permanent International Peace Bureau; (e) members and associates of the Institute of International Law; (f) university professors of Political Science and of Law, of History and of Philosophy; and (g) persons who have received the Nobel peace prize.

The Nobel peace prize may also be accorded to institutions or associations.

According to the code of statutes, section 8, the grounds upon which any proposal is made must be stated, and handed in along with such papers and other documents as may therein be referred to.

According to section 3, every written work, to qualify for a prize, must have appeared in print.

For particulars, qualified persons are requested to apply to the office of the Nobel committee of the Norwegian Parliament, Drammensvei 19, Kristiania.
