Omaha Charley Collection of Indian Relics on Display.

The Omaha Charley collection of Indian relics, recently secured by the State Historical Society, will soon be entirely mounted. Of the five hundred interesting and instructive groups of this collection, one case of Indian dolls is especially worthy of examination. These dolls are dressed in the costumes of the various tribes. One pair of Ogalalla dolls is unusually fine, representing a warrior and his squaw. Each wears a moon shell and is elaborately decorated in beads.

In the same case is an interesting, though gruesome relic, in the form of a quirt or Indian whip. The handle is of polished human bone, and for a lash is a human scalp of long, black hair, carefully braided and tied. The under side of the scalp is artistically decorated with bead work.
