**OLIVER MEETING.**

Rev. Swearingen to Speak—Amphion  
Quartet to Sing.

At the Y. M. C. A. meeting in the  
Oliver Theater tomorrow afternoon at  
3:30 o'clock, Rev. H. C. Swearingen,  
now pastor of the First Presbyterian  
church, will deliver a farewell address  
to the men of Lincoln. Rev. Swearin-  
gen has been with the First Presby-  
terian church for four years and has  
built up a large circle of friends in  
Lincoln during that time. He is now  
about to go to Saint Paul, where he  
will assume the pastorate of the sev-  
enth largest Presbyterian church in  
the United States, and his speech to-  
morrow will be almost his last one in  
Lincoln.
