CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS.

Government Wants Teachers and As-
sistants for the Philippines.

The executive office of the Univer-
sity is in receipt of announcements of
civil service examinations for the
positions of teacher and assistant
teacher in the Philippine Islands. The
examinations announced are post-
ponements of those previously set for No-
vember 30-December 1, and will be
held in Lincoln on December 27-28,
1906.

The examinations are intended
mainly for men, altho women will be
examined under certain conditions.
There are vacancies at the present
time for at least 100 teachers in the
islands at initial salaries of from
\$1,000 to \$1,200 per year, with the
prospect of a raise after a short ser-
vice. The work of these American
teachers is largely of a supervisory
character, and the higher positions are
filled as vacancies occur, by the pro-
motion of those who have demon-
strated their efficiency and ability in
the service.

A special plea is being made by the
government for college and university
graduates for this work and every in-
ducement is being offered to secure
their prompt appointment where the
examinations warrant such a proce-
dure. Any one desiring further infor-
mation concerning this work should
apply at the executive office of the
University.
