ALUMNUS TO WED.

S. E. Johnson, '00, Engaged to Prominent Boston Woman.

The following press dispatch from Boston says:

"The engagement of Miss Abble May Evans of Boston and Rev. Samuel Johnson of Lansing, O., formerly of Lincoln, Neb., was announced here today. Miss Evans is a noted Shakespearean scholar and public reader of wide reputation, the daughter of a clergyman, Rev. M. H. Evans, a well known Methodist divine of this state. Her brother is Dr. M. H. A. Evans, jr., of Roxbury, a Harvard graduate, and one of the leading physicians of the city. The date of the wedding is not set, but announcement cards have been rent out and a few weeks in all probability will see the happy union which is scheduled to be an important event here."

Rev. Johnson graduated from the University in 1900, receiving the degree of B. A. Since that time he has been studying at the Boston Theological Seminary, from which he graduated last year. He is at present pastor of the First Methodist church at Lansing, Ohio.

Freshmen Hold Banquet.

To cheer their drooping spirits after their failure to interfere with the attendance of prominent Sophomores at the hop last Friday evening, about thirty Freshmen decided to hold an impromptu banquet at Sam's Cafe and spent the evening in feeding the inner man and in recounting what they would like to have done to their erstwhile adversaries. Harvard Wins Debate.

The annual debate between Harvard and Yale was won by the former school. The question under discussion follows:

"Resolved, That further restriction of immigration is undesirable." By "further restriction" is meant the application of additional tests with the object of diminishing materially the number of immigrants, but the nature and practicability of such tests are not to be discussed.
