Every incentive that can be offered to induce young men of sterling ability to come to our institution is a boost for Nebraska and will result in a better University, a stronger citizenship, and an increased prestige for the state. The Y. M. C. A. employment bureau is doing an excellent work and we wish it success for the future.
