A GOOD SHOWING.

Figures of Last Year's Registration Complimentary to Nebraska.

The biennial report of the Board of Regents, which has just been published, gives some very interesting figures anent the registration at the University last year. Of the total registration of 2,914, less than 300 students came from outside Nebraska. This showing is a remarkable evidence of the confidence of Nebraskans in Nebraska and Nebraska institutions.

The exact number of young men and women registering from this state is 2,670, and the state having the next highest number is Iowa, with eighty-six. Then comes South Dakota with twenty-six and Kansas with twenty-three.

Lancaster county is designated as the home of 1,101 students, or more than one-third of the total enrollment, but this showing is misleading, as a very large number of such students have received their preparatory education in other counties and have merely made Lincoln their home during their college career.
