**STANDS UP FOR BONES.**

Dr. Ward Arouses Eastern Interest in Recent Nebraska Discovery.

The paper on "The Nebraska Man" which Dr. Ward recently read before the Anthropologists' Society in New York, awakened among eastern scientists a keen interest in our prehistoric wonder. The paper set forth the result of Professor Barbour's study of the geological character of the discovery as well as of Dr. Ward's and Professor Barbour's joint investigation of the bones.

As a result of this address, Dr. Ward was later asked to confer with the officials of the United States National Museum at Washington concerning the character of the skeletons. The officials were found to be very eager for information, but as Dr. Ward had no specimens with him to show them, he found plenty of doubting Thomases and was compelled to leave them somewhat incredulous.

While at Washington the doctor managed to secure for the University some valuable zoological specimens and photographs from the government bureau.

Another address delivered by Dr. Ward was that before the American Association for the Advancement of Science. This was the vice-presidential address on the subject of "The Influence of Parasitism in the Host." He also attended an invitation program of the American Society of Zoologists, and took part in the discussion on Protozoal Diseases.

**CO-EDUCATIONAL COOKERY.**

To Be on Exhibition at the Y. M. C. A. Feed a Week from Saturday Night.

Inspired by the unusual success which attended the last informal supper for all University men, which was prepared by Dr. Paine, the Y. M. C. A. is making plans for another similar function to be given a week from next Saturday night, which will be especially characterized by the presence and services of a number of co-eds in the capacity of expert cooks.

The campus comment following the last affair was so favorable that the social committee of the Y. M. C. A. has felt justified in attempting to introduce these University dinners for men into the regular social routine of our institution, and as the next one succeeds or falls thru will its plans be approved or rejected.

The dinner a week from next Saturday will be wholly a social affair and the program that will be offered after the feed will be entirely free from money raising devices. The purpose is avowedly social and it is hoped that a bond of real University interest may be established between the men who attend. Tickets, as usual, will cost 15 cents.
