cost to the company, of the service to the consumer, and the relation between actual cost to the company of rendering service and charge to the consumer for the same be considered.

Papers submitted by competitors must not exceed 10,000 words in length and must be mailed or delivered to an express company not later than March 15th, 1907, addressed to the "Chairman of the Committee of Judges, care of Clinton Rogers Woodruff, Esq., Secretary of the National Municipal League, North American Building, Philadelphia, and marked "For the William H. Baldwin Prize." Competitors will mark on each paper a "non-de-plume" and inclose in a sealed envelope the full name, address, class and college corresponding to such "non-de-plume."

Twelve manuscripts were submitted in competition for the William H. Baldwin Prize offered in 1906 by the National Municipal League for the best essay on the subject, "Franchise Grants to Gas and Electric Light Companies." The Honorable Henry L. McCune, Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Kansas City, Prof. Robert C. Brooks, of Swathmore College, and Ward W. Pierson, of the Wharton School, University of Pennsylvania, constituted the Board of Judges, and unanimously awarded the prize to Arno Woods, a member of the Sophomore Class of the University of Illinois.

PRACTISE BEGINS.

Work for Charter Day Starts With Large Squad Out.

Practise for Charter Day began Wednesday night. Quite a large squad was out but was composed almost altogether of new men. Work was done on the shot put, twenty-five yard dash, pole vault and high jump. McDonald in the pole vault and Coe and Buruss in the 25-yard dash, are already showing up well.

Practise will be held regularly from 4 to 5 p. m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and from 2:30 to 3:30 p. m. Saturday. All men are urged to get out regularly from now on. The importance of systematic work under an efficient coach cannot be overestimated. Dr. Clapp will devote part of his time to the men on each event, the hour being divided as follows: First 20 minutes, pole vault and shot put; second 20 minutes, 25-yard dash and rope climb; third 20 minutes, fence vault, high jump, high kick.

An Interesting Lecture.

The lecture on "the Moon and Eclipse" which had been postponed from Dec. 21, was delivered Thursday evening at the State Farm by Professor Swezey. Mr. Fee handled the slides in the new lantern, recently procured by the State Farm. The slides were all made from actual photographs taken with the telescope of the University Observatory and elsewhere.

Nearly all the students of the Farm attended the lecture, and the room was hardly capable of accommodating the attendance.
