**ART STUDENTS.**

Pushing to Front at Chicago Art Institute.

The Art department of the University of Nebraska is beginning to be known far and near, many large art schools having placed it upon their exchanges.

While visiting in Chicago recently Miss Hayden of the Art department, found a number of art students from this University winning particular recognition at the Art Institute of Chicago. Professor Barbour is still almost daily receiving skeletal fragments of the Nebraska Loess man from the quarries unearthed at Florence.
