ANENT THE ATHLETIC FIELD.

Nebraskan Receives Communication Showing Interesting Precedent.

The Nebraskan is in receipt of the following communication concerning the problem which is presented to our Board of Regents by its recent determination to utilize the athletic field for building purposes. We give it space with our approval and trust it may reach the spots from which prompt action will come:

"When a similar contingency arose at the University of Michigan fifteen years ago the student body appointed a representative committee which waited on the Board of Regents and expressed in strong and yet dignified manner the sentiments of the students on the proposed destruction of the athletic field. It was not possible then, as it probably will not be practicable here, to change the plan and locate the building elsewhere. But the Regents took up vigorously the

We merely wish to state that such is the case and draw our moral from it in connection with the coming benefit.

The University is back of the Settlement work officially. The University is made up chiefly of its student body. The members of this student body are therefore the persons who are, and should be, most interested in the advancement of the cause, to say nothing of the maintenance of the present standard of excellence. To accomplish either or both of these conditions the Settlement must have more funds than are available at present. The performance of the Swedish dancers is a means to this end and
