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A TRIPP RECITAL.

Famous Reader to Appear Under Auspices of Dramatic Club.

The University Dramatic Club has recently engaged Mr. Walter Bradley Tripp, a reader and dramatic producer of national reputation, to appear in recital in Memorial Hall on Thursday evening, January 24. Mr. Tripp is a famous Shakesperian student and reader and will give for his program in Lincoln a complete rendition of "King Henry IV."

For a number of years attempts have been made to secure Mr. Tripp for an appearance in Lincoln, but always heretofore he has been unable to sign a contract for an available date. The Dramatic Club considers itself unusually fortunate, therefore, in being able to bring Mr. Tripp to Lincoln this year. His program will be a treat not only to the average student who enjoys clever impersonation, but will appeal as well to every student of the classical in English literature as well.

It is hoped that Mr. Tripp can be in Lincoln long enough to appear at a special Convocation in addition to his regular program but it is not as yet known whether the necessary arrangements can be made.

TO ENTER UNIVERSITY.

Famous Young Naturalist to Take Up Work at Nebraska.

Mr. Harold Cook of the Cook Ranch of Sloux county, the young man who last year discovered the fossilized skeleton of the four-horned antelope, and for whom the genus was named "Syndyoceras Cooki," is now in Lincoln and will enter the University next semester.

The antelope skeleton which Mr. Cook last year presented to the State Museum is being reconstructed by Professor Barbour, who hopes soon to have it photographed, and to publish his statement regarding the possible nature of the prehistoric animal.

For years Mr. Cook has made collections for the larger museums of the country, the Carnegie Museum of Pittsburg being the recipient of many of his most valuable specimens.

The latest addition the young man has made to his private collection is the body of a veteran timber wolf that has for years been the rogue of northwestern Nebraska. Mr. Cook has just succeeded in killing the evasive animal with poison. The old wolf, which is of gigantic size and has a pelt which is white with age, is estimated by Professor Barbour to be worth over one hundred dollars for museum purposes.

Mr. Cook will take up scientific work, paying particular attention to geological and geographical studies. He was a student at the Lincoln High School last year.

State Aid for High Schools.

The seminar in Education has been busy collecting data on the subject of state aid to high schools. Letters from all the state superintendents of the country have been received, and some very interesting material secured. A surprising number of states, it is found, intend to give state aid many of them thru the legislatures now in session.

This movement, ten years ago, was confined to one or two states where it met much opposition and ridicule. Now it seems destined to be tried everywhere. Even in this state the movement bids fair to be soon adopted.

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
