CANDIDATES TO MEET.

Contestants for Parts in Senior Play to Consult with Coach.

All Seniors interested in the "Taming of the Shrew," which has been decided for production during Senior week next spring, are requested to meet with Professor Losey, who is to coach the play, this evening at 7:30 o'clock sharp in U. 208. The meeting will be for the purpose of lining up selections for use in the tryout for parts, which will come within two weeks after the beginning of the new semester.

It is expected that Professor Losey will read selections from the play to illustrate his conceptions of the various characters, and to indicate the portions of the play which he believes offer the best tryout possibilities. Invitations are extended not only to those Seniors who have already signified their intentions to tryout for parts in the play, but to all who are at all interested in its success. It is believed that when the opportunities which the "Taming of the Shrew" presents, are made apparent, there will be a decided increase in the number of candidates for parts.

The play committee and Professor Losey are anxious to secure a list of candidates for tryouts which will insure the proper individual among the Seniors for each part, and it is hoped that over fifty candidates will signify their intention to contest.
