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**PROFESSOR FRENCH SPEAKS.**

Talks at Convocation on "Evolution of Conscience."

Professor French spoke at Convocation yesterday morning on "Evolution of Conscience." He spoke of the meeting at Columbia University, New York, of the American Association for the advancement of science. A committee of ten was appointed to devise an appropriate memorial for the fiftieth anniversary of Darwin's Origin of Species. We are honored by having one of this committee from the University of Nebraska.

Every problem has been treated from an evolutionary standpoint, and the doctrine of evolution has broken down the barriers of species. Heredity and religion are the results of evolution, but moral natures could not spring from animals. Worth is not determined by origin, for conscience is slowly developed, emerging at a late period. The truly moral act involves self-determination.

He spoke of the superstitions of "Taboo" in which, among certain Islanders of the Pacific, a ban is placed upon things which must be avoided. Some things are considered too sacred, others too impure to touch. Thus the people fear to come in contact with blood or with corpses. Some not willing to use water will go thru fire for purification. The essence of "Taboo" with all its superstitions, however, has developed respect for human life and for property.
