THE CALL OF OFFICE.

The "Call of Office" is beginning to make itself manifest in the various classes of the University. Presidential possibilities are occupying the attention of numerous will-be politicians of our institution, and again the question of patronage versus merit is playing its role in the skirmish which is to precede the real campaign.

The Daily Nebraskan, which has stood unqualifiedly for the merit system as opposed to the barter of influence for position, thruout the past semester, has its usual suggestion to make in preparation for the struggle which, in at least two classes of the University, will be unusually keen. We suggest that the members of each class investigate every candidate who is proposed for office, and we urge that the investigation start at once.

In our opinion no man should be eligible to any office in his class who does not announce his candidacy formally thru the columns of the Nebraskan at least one week before his class election is held. In this way, and in this way only, can classes protect themselves from the grip of ring rule which takes all to itself and gives but very little to the rank and file of the class in return.

It is needless to prove that ring control gives uniformly mismanaged classes. An equitable distribution of patronage is absolutely necessary to the best welfare of any organization and this can never be secured thru clique interests. It is to the interest of every University class, therefore, to elect its officials cautiously and with due consideration. Neither the "call of office" nor the chance of personal preferment should overbalance the scales in favor of a candidate when he is obviously unfitted for the office which he seeks.

PROFESSOR LOSEY LECTURES.

Gives Preliminary Talk to Contestants for Senior Play.

Nearly seventy-five members of the Senior class gathered in U. 106 on Tuesday evening and listened to an hour's talk from Professor Losey in regard to the "Taming of the Shrew," which has been selected by the committee of the fourth year class for use as the Senior play.

The purpose of the lecture was to open up the possibilities which the play presents and to enthuse the Seniors in their attitude toward its production. Portions of various scenes were read and commented upon by Professor Losey, and an informal talk on the practical value of dramatic training closed the lecture.

A majority of Seniors present signified their intentions of trying out for the play and prospects are exceedingly bright for a cast that will be as nearly adequate to the demands of the play as could be expected. The play committee desires to obtain the names of all who intend to try out at the earliest possible date. The demand for men is especially strong and there are excellent opportunities for all Senior men who will put in what effort is required for a short tryout.

Professor Losey advocates a tryout of not more than twenty or thirty lines, taken from a critical point in the play, and asks that so far as possible all tryouts shall be individual. Tryouts will be held very soon after the final examinations and at least two evenings will be devoted to the purpose.
