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New Courses in Public Law.

Among the new courses to be offered during the second semester, the department of Public Law comes in for a liberal share. The course on Contemporaneous International Politics will be a most valuable course to all who are interested in the larger relations of states. It will deal with such questions as the Monroe Doctrine, the Balance of Power in Europe, the Far Eastern Question, the Partition of Africa. Closely related to it, tho covering a longer period, is the course in Eastern Diplomacy. In view of the great defects in our consular system and the increased possibilities of the consular service, the course on Consular Service should be a most interesting and valuable course. Thus far American, unlike German universities, have given little attention to questions relating to foreign affairs. The recent change is an encouraging and commendable one.

Dr. Edwin Maxey will have charge of the new classes in Public Law. This is Prof. Maxey's first year at Nebraska. He came here last fall from the State University of West Virginia and has proved a popular and successful teacher.
