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KANSAS TONIGHT

BASKET-BALL GAME PROMISES TO BE WARM AFFAIR.

Nebraska Well Prepared—Kansas Without Allen—The Kansan Not Overconfident.

Tonight at 8:15 Nebraska meets her old athletic rival in a game of basketball at the Armory. From all indications it will be one of the fastest games ever played on the local floor and much interest is centering around it. Nebraska's team, the without Hagensiek, one of the star forwards of last year, is, in the opinion of a great many, the best aggregation of the sort ever got together here, but in Kansas is a rival to test the mettle of the best. The first game after the resumption of athletic relations, played last fall, resulted for us in a disastrous defeat, but Allen, at least, the Kansas man who played so important a part at that time, will not be in the game tonight. Indeed, the Kansan does not display any very great amount of confidence in the outcome, tho its account of the team's strength cannot, of course, be accepted at face value.

The Kansas team arrived today and are putting up at the Royal Hotel. The men are all in good shape and ready to play the game of their lives. The line-up:

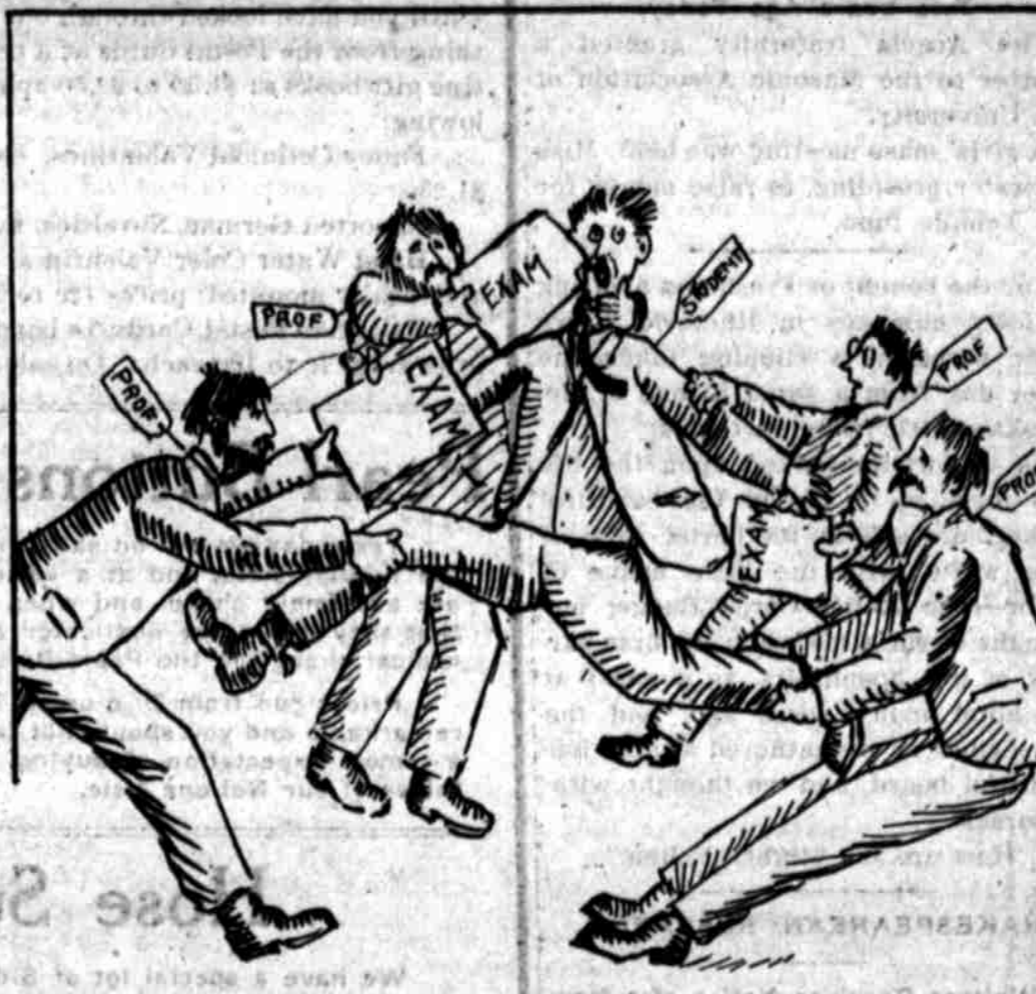

THE "BIG FOUR"

TO BE THE NEW CONFERENCE OF THE WEST.

The Proposed Compact is Practically Assured—Proposition Ratified by All Schools Except Michigan.

The arrangement to form a new conference among the Universities of Michigan, Minnesota, Chicago, and Wisconsin has been ratified by three of the schools and the fourth member of the compact—Michigan—is expected to get into line within a few days and give its approval. Students at the Ann Arbor institution are in favor of the proposed agreement.

The proposition for forming the organization was made at a conference of representatives of the four universities held in Chicago, January 12. It was proposed, not in order to pacify Michigan, but to establish closer relations among the four schools. The agreement now applies only to football, but probably will be extended to other forms of sport.

By this new organization the "Big Nine" will be somewhat weakened, but will continue to live. The coalition is one organization within another, formed to meet the needs of four of the nine universities, and in which the smaller colleges are not directly interested. The fact, however, that the old conference contains a strong body within itself cannot help weakening the power of that institution. But a significant clause in the resolution adopted by the four universities represented says that the continuance of the coalition during the second year shall be subject to reconsideration at a request of a single member of the conference, and that each participant in the arrangement shall retain the right to withdraw after such consideration.
