New Professorship at Wisconsin.

A "Carl Schurtz memorial professorship" is to be established at the University of Wisconsin as a result of the movement recently started in Milwaukee by a number of prominent German-Americans. The plan is to raise an endowment of \$50,000, the income of which will be used for the establishment of an annual course of lectures at the state university, to be given by prominent professors of German universities. This memorial professorship, to be held by German professors, will be the first one of the kind in any American state university. It is hoped that the establishment of this new chair will lead to the exchange of professors between the University of Wisconsin and German universities.

Paper on Economics.

Mrs. Dr. Minnie T. England is publishing a paper discussing the relation of prices in general and also prices of different commodities of the principal countries of the world through the crises of the past century.

This is an extremely important contribution to economic research not only because of its bearing upon economic and commercial interest, but it is a special line untouched as yet by anyone else.

Dr. England will probably follow this paper with popular statements of research better adapted to those who read magazines devoted to the interests of Economics.
