R. M. WILDISH WINS

SOPHOMORE PRESIDENCY GOES TO AURORA BOY.

Anti-Ring Element of the Second Year Class Gains Victory—End of Warm Fight—Dobbs Withdraws.

The so-called Anti-Ring faction of the second year students won a great victory yesterday and succeeded in electing R. M. Wildish of Aurora, to the highest office in the Sophomore class. Mr. Wildish was chosen on the third ballot, after S. P. Dobbs had withdrawn from the race. The last vote stood 102 to 86.

Eighty-Day Tour Being Planned for University and Nebraska People.

Plans have been made already for the sixth personally conducted excursion to Europe from the University and the State of Nebraska.

The party will leave Lincoln about June 18th and proceed to Montreal via Niagara Falls and Thousand Islands, sailing from Montreal June 22nd on Royal Mail Steamer of the Atlantic S. S. Co., owned by the Canadian Pacific Railroad Co., passing Quebec and out the St. Lawrence river; arrive at Liverpool June 8th, and spend 60 days in England, France, Italy, Switzerland, Germany, Belgium and Holland.

July 8-13—Six busy days in London,

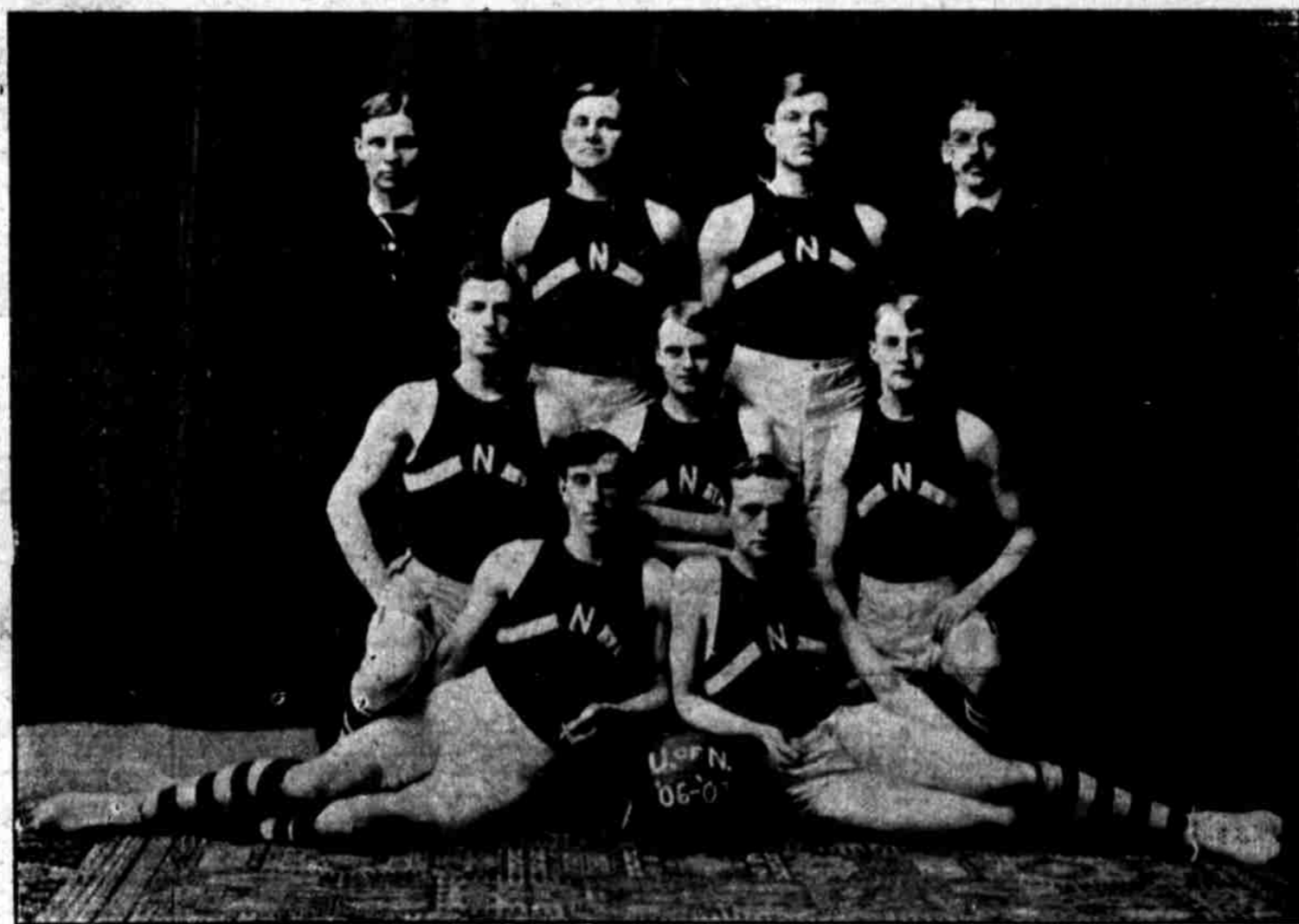
TODAY'S EVENTS

INDICATIONS POINT TO A STRONG PROGRAM.

Contestants in Good Trim—Commencement Exercises—G. P. Irish to Speak—Regents' Meeting.

All indications point to the carrying out of a strong Charter Day program today. Full preparations for every event are completed. The Gymnasium is in readiness and the Memorial Hall is being decorated this forenoon for the commencement exercises.

All of the thirty-three men who will enter the various athletic contests are in fine trim, and in many events the contestants will be closely matched. Sixteen men, four from each fraternity, will compete for the honors in the in-

candidates in the race—Roy Nelson, of Oakland; R. M. Wildish of Aurora; and S. P. Dobbs of Beatrice. Three ballots were cast. The first gave Nelson, 81; Wildish, 72; Dobbs, 62, and the second stood, Nelson, 80; Wildish, 80; Dobbs, 40. Mr. Dobbs withdrew after the second ballot had been cast and the third resulted in a majority of sixteen votes for Wildish.

The election of Mr. Wildish closed one of the most exciting campaigns of the year. The fight for the office of president began about three weeks ago when R. Nelson obviously supported by the Iron Sphinx, went into the field to secure the position. Mr. Nelson and his loyal workers pursued a systematic campaign, and in a few days had the name Nelson going around the campus like a Chicago mayoralty boom on Lake Michigan. Nelson had not been in the field long when S. P. Dobbs of Beatrice backed by an Anti-Sphinx element, got into the running. Dobbs also did (Continued on page 3.)
