stimulated; abuses would be more clearly noted; remedies would be more zealously sought and easier found; groundless complaint would measurably subside; useless impracticable agitation would diminish; reform movements would gain in practicability and promise; and the political atmosphere generally would be materially cleared.  
"I submit that it is wise and patriotic to agitate for a Convention to propose amendments to the Constitution."

**Important New Encyclopedia.**  
The University Library recently received a very valuable and scholarly work of twelve volumes, "The Jewish Encyclopedia." This is the standard source of information on all matters pertaining to the history, customs and religion of the Jewish people, and it will be of inestimable value to students of Hebrew literature or of theology.  
The work was edited by the well known writer, Isador Singer, assisted by a committee of several other distinguished men.
