man has been always more or less the brute, he has been able to decide few really serious questions without fighting. But the age of war must pass, the fighting spirit must be subordinated to a higher one of reason and justice.

The spirit of American history is the spirit of liberty, but the American people must understand and remember that to secure this liberty means they must learn to observe the law. For only by developing the spirit of observance of law can we arrive at the highest liberty.

Today there is a quickening of the moral sense, of the public conscience never known before. The people are demanding higher standards in business life, they are insisting on more equitable relations between labor and capital. They are insisting on better laws and fewer, they are coming to a realization of the interests of the commonwealth and of society as a co-operative body and to demand that these interests and rights be respected.

American citizenship today requires the broadest culture. More than practical sense, more than knowledge of the present is required. To judge of events in their true significance, to estimate the true value of things, a knowledge of the past, an acquaintance with the best that the world has produced, an understanding of its progress and experience is necessary. Hence culture is a fundamental requisite for the best citizenship and the greatest progress of the nation.

The spirit of American history has been the inspiration of its makers, it has incited and sustained those who pushed out across the continent. The spirit of the future and the traditions of the past will be the inspiration of those who are to make our history in the days to come.

Dr. C. E. Bessey has been elected vice-president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and chairman of Section G of the association. The next meeting will be held at Chicago next winter.
