**THE HONOR SYSTEM.**

Is Being Tried at Indiana and California.

The Universities of Indiana and California are experimenting with the honor system and both are pleased with it.

At California the students recently voted to adopt the honor system and will introduce it into the athletics of the school. No fence will be put around the baseball field this spring and the management will trust entirely to the honor of the students, who will be expected to pay for admission to the grounds without any urging.

The honor system was introduced at Indiana in the midyear "Medic" examinations with great success and will be continued in that department of the school.
