REFORMS IN THE EAST.

Dr. Jordan Talks at Convocation.

"Persia" and its new reform move-
ment was the subject of Mr. S. M. Jor-
den's address at Convocation yester-
day morning. The Shah, he said, has
proclaimed a new parliament, the first
since the days of Cyrus and Darius.
The question is often asked if this re-
form will be permanent and to affirm
this, it is interesting as well as neces-
sary to study the forces behind the
movement.

The first force lies in the Persian
character itself, that of liberality. The
kings are liberal, the priests, who
came with rich gifts to worship the in-
fant Christ who was the leader of a
rival religion, were also liberal. Mo-
hammedanism failed to hold the
Persians and now in derision for the
Mohammedan religion the lowest
officer in the Persian army is called a
"sultan." One of the Persian sects
is responsible for the Behel Move-
ment which professes to be a religion
one degree higher than Mohammedan-
ism or is the next stage in the evolu-
tion of true religion. They believe in
Abraham, in the laws of Moses and in
Christ, but in trying to reform Mo-
hammedanism for Christianity with-
out Christ, they have had a disinteg-
rating influence.

The prosperity of christian nations
has influenced the Persians largely
and led to the belief that God blesses
the righteous. Medical missionaries
and the great work of hospitals have
rendered sincere service to God in a
manner to bring about the highest
trust and confidence in Americans.

Ascribing the progress of Japan to
its educational system and even to
religious liberty, the Persians found
another element in the Russo-Japan-
ese war. Not only the government is
liberal but the Shah himself is an
easy incumbent who favors the new
movement. The Persians are bright
and realize the value of education,
but it is of no value to any one unless
accompanied by morality and religion.
