PROFESSOR TAFT HERE.

Chicago Sculptor and Author Visiting Mr. Jewett.

Professor Lorado Taft, instructor at the Chicago Art Institute, is at present visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Jewett, being a cousin of the latter. Professor Taft is a sculptor and author of considerable note. A number of his works were on exhibition both at the Pan-American Exposition, where he won a silver medal; and at the St. Louis Exposition, where he won the gold medal.

Besides instructing at the Art Institute, Mr. Taft gives a course of lectures on Art at the University of Chicago. He is a member of both the American Sculptors' Society and the Western Society of Artists. His principal publication is a "History of American Sculpture."

urned nook with fire-place, and a private room opening off it; also the Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. rooms, each having a large meeting room about 36 feet square with an office and private room, while the young men have a fair sized anteroom besides. The main lobby containing the clerks' desk and the stairways is 40 by 26.

On the second floor is a small concert hall for the matinee musical, a general meeting room for all of the University societies, a trophy and alumni room, and a scientific lecture room. The general meeting room and lecture room both have private rooms opening off them and large fireplaces.

The three literary societies have that part of the third floor not given over to the upper part of the auditorium. These societies, Delian, Palladian, and Union which have been forced to suspend more or less during the past year because of cramped quarters, have good accommodations offered them in the Temple. Each has a large hall and stage, a dressing room, a coat room, and a committee room.

There is talk of a general military room on the second floor. This will be a room for the cadets of the University battalion and will be supplied with books and magazines upon such subjects. The location of the band room in the Temple will make possible the use of their present quarters for the office of the Military Department.

Dr. C. Seashore, Professor of Psychology at the University of Iowa, visited the campus recently, stopping here on his return home from Wahoo, where he delivered a lecture. He invited Dr. Bolton to give an address on "Growth of Personality" before the Philosophic Society at Iowa University, March 27.

Dr. Henry Van Dyke, who has held the Murray Professorship of English for the last eight years, has resigned from the university faculty. It is supposed he wishes more time for the prosecution of his literary work.

Richard H. Dearborn, Professor of Electrical Engineering at Oregon State University at Eugene, visited the campus yesterday.
