**ENGINEERING NOTES.**

The Engineering Society has just completed arrangements to bring Dr. William R. Kent to the University the latter part of April, when he will deliver two addresses to the engineering students. Dr. Kent is Dean of the College of Engineering at Syracuse University, and is one of the most widely known mechanical engineers in the United States. He is the author of several technical texts, including "Kent's Mechanical Engineer's Pocket Book," which is one of the standard references for engineers and has, perhaps, the widest circulation and is the most generally accepted text of its kind. It is frequently referred to by engineers as "The Engineer's Bible." On Steam Boilers and their application and use, he is a recognized authority and the Society is to be congratulated in securing the services of so prominent a man. He will deliver two lectures: one on "Steam Boilers" and another on some more general topic, the subject of which is not yet announced.
