SENIOR MEETING.

Medic-Cornhusker Business Before Class Again.

At a rather spirited meeting of the Senior Class held yesterday, the resolutions presented by the Medic students were taken up and discussed. The resolutions in effect call for the granting of a Managing Editorship on the Cornhusker to the Medical School at Omaha, and were the cause of a long drawn out discussion in the meeting. The representatives of the Medics were out in force and their side of the controversy was well presented by several of their members. Their claim is that they should have equal representation on the Cornhusker staff with the Senior and Junior Classes and with the Law School. While they do not claim so large a body of students as any of these classes, they maintain that they are a separate college of the University of Nebraska and should have representation on the Cornhusker, which is supposed to be the representative book of the University. They admitted that the interest shown by the Medics at Omaha in the book has not been what it should be and explained it by the fact that the associate editors, who now represent the Medical School, are appointed by the Editor-in-chief, and the Medics have no voice in their selection. It naturally follows that their interest would be rather lax on this account.

Those who opposed the granting of the claims of the Medics stated that their reason for so doing was that the Medical students were so small a percentage of the students represented in the other classes that it was unfair

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
