\$15,000 to Shurtleff College at Alton, Ill.

Andrew Carnegie's gift of \$15,000 to Shurtleff College at Alton, Ill., for library purposes, has aroused some interest because of Mr. Carnegie's former refusal to give any funds to the college on the grounds that it was educating young men to become Baptist ministers without paying tuition, thereby pauperizing the school. President Riggs finally satisfied Mr. Carnegie that the divinity students were working for their tuition, and now expects \$15,000 by June next.

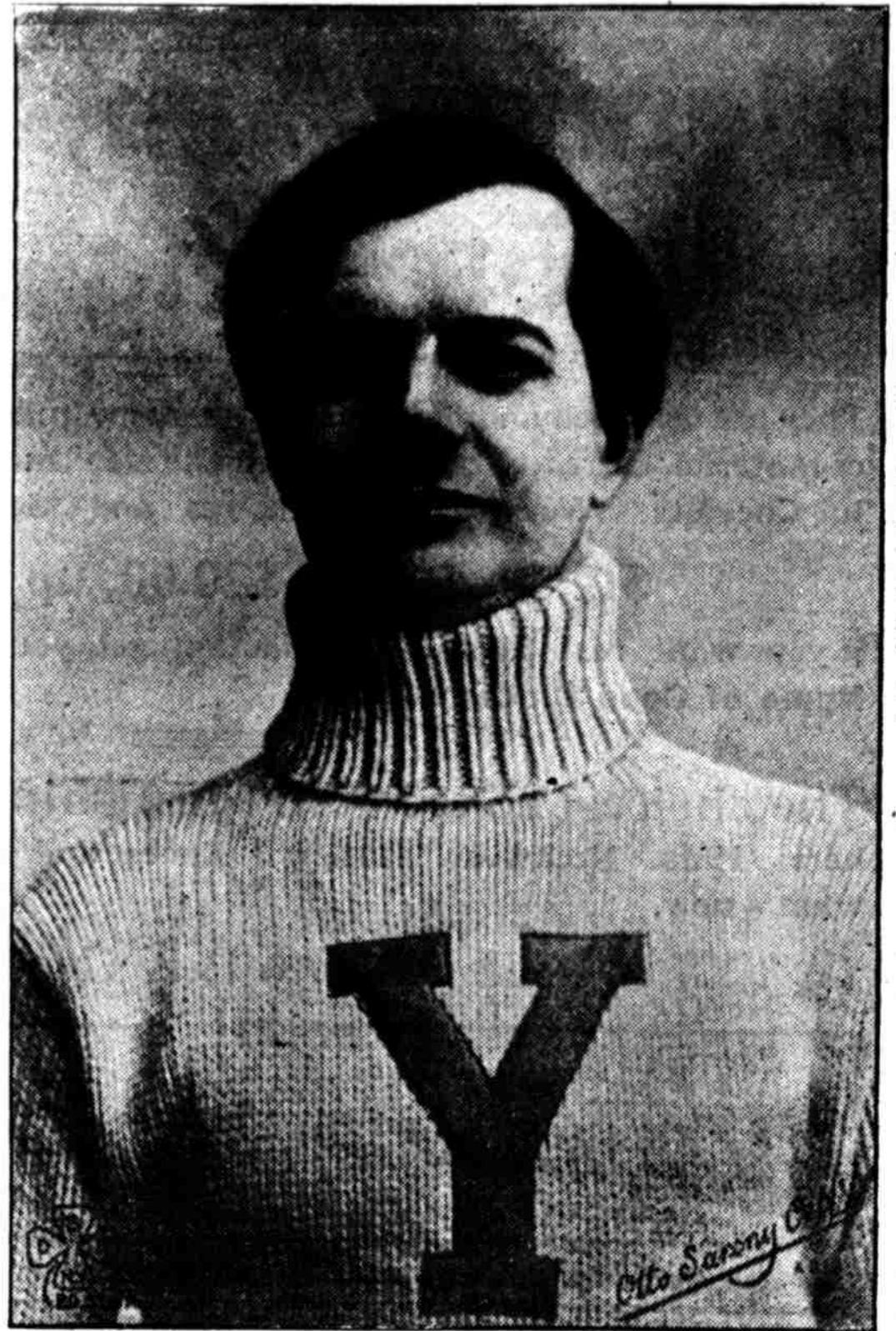
ENGINEERING NOTES.
A. G. Wessling, Assistant Engineer of the Bullock Manufacturing company gave a talk to the Engineering students yesterday at 11 o'clock in M. 208. His subject was "Special Apprenticeship" and was given especially to Mechanical and Electrical engineering students, with a view toward getting them interested in the special apprenticeship courses offered by the Bullock Power Machinery company to University Engineering graduates.
