ENGINEERING NOTES.

As in previous years, the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company, of Pittsburg, Penn., has announced its Engineering Apprentice Course for the coming year. It is the desire of the company to enlist a number of graduates of technical schools and universities in this course. They will be placed in the shops and laboratories of the company, where they will be enabled to obtain practical training in the various branches. In this course the work of the technical school will besupplemented by practical training in both mechanical and electrical engineering, and at the end of a two years apprenticeship, the students who have shown the proper aptness, will be placed in various responsible positions with the company in their many plants thruout the United States.

The apprentice will continue work in the course until he has prepared himself for filling the regular positions mentioned, and in no case will he be expected to remain in the apprenticeship for a period of more than two years. The pay for the first year of apprenticeship will be 16 cents per hour, while that for the second year will be 18 cents per hour.

Each student is placed on probation for the first three months. At the end of this time, each applicant must execute with the company a regular form of agreement covering the entire term of the course. During this term of probation, as well as during the whole time of apprenticeship, the company reserves the right to discharge any student, for misbehavior, inattention to duty, or for any like cause. It is expected that several of this year's graduates from the engineering courses in the University will avail themselves of the opportunities afforded by this course.
