BEVERIDGE LEE.

Speaks at Convocation on Ideals and Aims.

Dr. J. Beveridge Lee spoke in a very pleasing way at Convocation yesterday morning on our ideals and aims. The greatest competition that one has in life, he said, is one's self and that competition is often a mean one. Every man should learn the lesson that success in life does not mean to get ahead of the other fellow. Our ideals need to be recolored and enlarged.

By way of illustration, he told of a skull he had found in Jerusalem and had taken back to Milwaukee with him, where a phrenologist had examined it. From this old piece of bone he had been able to tell that the man when living had possessed neither faith nor hope. If man can thus read us, what is the use to play the hypocrit with God? Do not minimize the value of spiritual qualities. It is better to have much faith and little ambition rather than the opposite; faith, rest of all, in yourself. Hope, also, is a valuable asset. It is indeed a dreary prospect when an aged man has no bright future to look forward to; has little in the present, and can not enjoy or live in the past.

The Mohammedans in their service constantly repeat the word "Allah," using the name of our God, altho in a different sense. If we are to be Mohammedans, we should be the best possible, but as we are all considered Christians to all the Orient, we should live up to the light that we have and be the best Christians possible, living up to the great example of Jesus Christ.
