

TAKES BIG LEAP.

Relief Fund Jumps From Sixty

The famine relief fund took a great leap upward yesterday when the sum of \$31.50 was added. Seventeen dollars of this came in thru one organization, but even the difference between this and the total is a larger sum than has come in at any previous time.

As has been stated before, it should not be thought that the time for giving is drawing to a close. Plainly the needs for which the fund is going are not relieved in a day or a week. More and more interest ought to be taken, so that at the close of next week the amount given should double that contributed this past week.

One point to be emphasized is that not every contributor is expected to give a dollar. That amount is a handy unit to use in connection with this work, of course, because it is sufficient to save one man from starving, but two half dollars or four quarters will do it just as well, and there is one advantage in receiving more and smaller contributions-more people get in on the business. W. secretary and it will be just as effective. The giver's name is withheld if the desire is expressed.
