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SERIOUSLY AGAIN.

Some time ago a little discussion
was indulged in regarding that serious
subject, religion, so called. The
discussion was dropped with the state-
ment that probably not enough at-
tention was paid to it among students
and with the suggestion that there
were reasons, no doubt, for this lack
of interest. There are two reasons
comparatively plain.

One of these is the attitude of cer-
tain instructors toward the matter.
Now, it is hoped this will not be mis-
understood; there is no attack here
made upon ideas, broad ideas or ra-

lead to broader living. Which is the
better, a good man with narrow views
or an intellectually broad man with
immoral character? Both these com-
binations are not uncommon, but most
people would prefer to live as neigh-
bor to the former.

Perhaps these teachings result most
commonly in nothing more seri-
ous than indifference, but then the stu-
dent is missing a privilege of attaining
a new sense of life and its meaning
which ought to be the best and great-
est thing in a university course. A
graduate ought to go out feeling the
capacity now to live more broadly, not
simply to think more broadly than
when he entered his course.

The other reason for lack of the so-
called religious spirit is the tendency
of the student himself to cut loose
from restraint and old customs to
which he has been used. This side of
the matter deserves plenty of atten-
tion also, but the conclusion to be
reached here after all, is similar to the
one cited above.
