LOCAL BASEBALL SEASON WILL OPEN SATURDAY.

Missouri Has a Strong Team-Nebraska Nine is Being Strength-

ened. Line-up.

The first intercollegiate baseball game of the season will take place next Saturday at 3:30 on Nebraska field. The Cornhuskers will cross bats with Missouri University for the first time in several years.

Missouri seems to have a strong team this year and should put up a good game. They beat Iowa Tuesday and the Hawkeyes have a strong team this year, having beaten the Rock Island league team. This will be the eighth game for the Missourians on their big trip thru Iowa, Illinois, Kansas and Nebraska. On their home grounds Missouri has lost twice to Knox, but Knox has an unusually strong team. They have played two games with Kansas at Lawrence winning one 9-3, and losing the other 0-5.

It is hard to compare the Cornhuskers with Missouri, neither team having played any game by which a line may be obtained on the other. At present, the Cornhuskers are none too strong but they may be expected to pick up rapidly and put up a much better game Saturday than heretofore.

They have been peculiarly unfortunate in losing the services of Carroll the regular catcher. One of his fingers was torn off in a game with the Lincoln league team and he will be out of the game for some time. Today Nebraska meeta Wesleyan in a practice game at University Place.
