ing came to order, and the first ballot resulted in the choice of Mr. Bullta by the close vote of 49 to 48. Mr. Alden was the only candidate for the office of assistant business manager, and his election was unanimous.
The two unsuccessful candidates are prominent Juniors and have taken an active part in University affairs. Mr. Bullta is a member of the Phi Delta Theta fraternity and was alternate on the Nebraska-Wisconsin debating team this year. Mr. Alden devotes much time to athletics and was a member of the Cornhusker Cross Country team that won the Western Cross Country run at Chicago last fall.
The election by the Juniors yesterday completed the main portion of the 1908 Cornhusker staff. The editor-in-chief, the business manager, and the managing editor for the Class of 1909 were elected a few weeks ago. The members of the staff elected to date are as follows: A. Jorgensen, editor-in-chief; D. Russell, business manager; F. C. Bullta, 1908 managing editor; S. Dobbs, 1909 managing editor; C. L. Alden, assistant business manager.
The editor-in-chief of the book receives eight hours University credit for his work and the managing editors get four hours each. The business manager receives no University credit but is paid twenty per cent of the sum derived from the advertising published in the book. From this twenty per cent he pays his assistant manager.

SWIMMING CLASSES STOPPED.

Aquatic Sport in Gym Classes to Be No More.
There will be no more swimming of the classes in Physical Education at the city Y. M. C. A. swimming pool. This is the recent decision announced by a committee chosen to decide the matter. The objection raised against it was that it might prove an undesirable policy to allow outside parties the use of the athletic field during the summer, for it was upon this agreement that the privilege of using the swimming pool was granted. The affair was referred to different authorities several times but was finally settled by a committee of three composed of the Chancellor, Mr. Fee and Mr. Dales. The majority of this committee decided against the arrangement then in force.
The Chancellor and Dr. Clapp have since attempted to make other arrangements, but so far without avail, owing to the fact that the Y. M. C. A. is averse to renting their pool on a financial consideration.
The secretaries of the debating boards in the central University debating circuit are corresponding with regard to the question for the five simultaneous debates next year.
