the least nor give one a license to "rest on his oars." A man must know his business from the foundation up—he must make himself the best in his line. He must "deliver the goods" in large quantities, for men ask the question—not "How many degrees has he?" but, "Can he deliver the goods?" If he can and does, he can always be sure that he will be needed.

Then, too, one must not neglect his personal ideals, the further education of his powers of mind and soul, the broadening of his horizon. A man lives and acts not from outer, but from inner motives, and successful living depends upon the stature of the inner man.

Then because the "cold world" is retroactive, just as the college world is retroactive, it will adjust itself to a man just as a man adjusts himself to it, and the college alumnus can answer the question, "How does the cold world feel?" In the words of his answer to the question, "How am I meeting the problems of the world?"
