Lehigh Hazing Rules.

Lehigh University has adopted the following rules to govern the hazing of freshmen:


1. No freshman shall be in any way interfered with, or in any way hazed after 6 p. m., unless caught, when voluntarily on the streets, after 7 p. m.

2. Juniors shall not take active part in hazing affairs or rushes, except to organize the freshmen on the night before the opening day, opening day rush, and on the night before Founder's day.

3. The Law and Order Committee shall have jurisdiction for the enforcement of these rules and shall have authority to restrain and punish excesses in hazing.

Indiana University opened last week with a large number of students. Last fall 1,150 students were registered and this year it is expected that 1,300 will start the first semester. Besides many changes in the faculty, a new course in Journalism will be launched under the direction of Dr. W. D. Howe, of the English department. Arthur Murray, of the Muncie Star, will be an associate professor.
