AS TO CONVOCATION.

There is not the least question that the importance of attending Convocation is not properly appreciated by many of the students in this University. It is not strange that such is the case on the part of the new students, for were the matter not impressed upon them there is nothing left for them to do but learn by experience. It is to avoid this unnecessary loss, that mention is made of the subject at this time.

There is perhaps no one practice of a wholly voluntary nature that will result in an equal amount of benefit to the person concerned as that of a regular and systematic attendance at convocation. The importance of this function is recognized by the University Senate and they have accordingly stipulated that nothing shall displace or take the place of a feature at Convocation, nor can the chapel be used for any other purpose at the time usually assigned for it. This attitude on the part of the Senate is the result of a conviction that the time spent by students at chapel exercise could not be better employed. It is also the experience of students
