Into the 'line' Mr. Ade put truth and a shrewd American observation upon the value of advertising. Athletic contests advertise a college more widely than any other form of advertising and in these days of many universities and keen competition the advertisement is needed. A good football eleven may serve to secure much patronage for a college, and participation in intercollegiate contests fosters healthy, wholesome college pride. The percentage of students who take part in contests is small; the devotion of a student to athletics does not always make him a drone at his books, and a lively interest in athletics makes for a wider interest in gymnasium work and out-door exercise among students who need physical development, but do not care to try for teams.
"The institution that formally eliminates intercollegiate athletic contests must run the rick of being rated as a mollycoddle, and the average young American is not inclined to view with enthustiasm, or even complacency, the prospect of being enrollea at a mollycoddle institution."
