The percentage of students who take part in contests is small; the devotion of a student to athletics does not always make him a drone at his books, and a lively interest in athletics makes for a wider interest in gymnasium work and out-door exercise among students who need physical development, but do not care to try for teams.

"The institution that formally eliminates intercollegiate athletic contests must run the risk of being rated as a mollycoddle, and the average young American is not inclined to view with enthusiasm, or even complacency, the prospect of being enrolled at a mollycoddle institution."
