work. He loved young men who were
developed on every side—men who
were strong morally, mentally, and
physically. He touched upon the im-
portance of athletics to obtain a broad
and complete development.

Judge Loomis urged all to culti-
vate the power to concentrate on a
given task. Nothing could be accom-
plished without hard work. We can-
not afford to fall in anything, for
every time we fall it leaves its im-
pression upon us. We may be driven
to the wall by forces beyond our con-
trol, but we need never be led to the
wall.

He urged the value and importance
of large heartedness, and declared
that this is what makes true great-
ness.

Speaking more directly to the stu-
dents, he urged them to let their
political actions be governed by their
convictions rather than by expedi-
ency. Try and determine the ques-
tions which lie at the bottom of our
life, for the best interests of all the
people. Love of country should be
placed above our love of party. We
should study the principles underly-
ing our past life, for principles al-
ways have been and always will be
the same.
