Captain Weller has not yet fully recovered from the Ames game, but will probably enter the game today in his old form. The poor condition of the men has occasioned great anxiety on the part of the coaches during the week and the report of general improvement in the condition of the team is welcomed by the Cornhusker supporters.

The preparations at Kansas are described in the following Lawrence special:

"Stick to your team, win or lose," was the topic of Chancellor Frank Strong's talk to the students in chapel this morning. There has been considerable knocking on the Jayhawker team since last Saturday's defeat at the hands of Washburn and it was this sentiment to which the chancellor referred.

"The victor gets too much praise," he said. "We must learn to give our sympathy and support to the man who fights hard and loses."

The chancellor also condemned betting. "When a team feels that a good deal of money has been bet on it, the men become excited and are forced to bear a responsibility that should be entirely foreign to college sport."

The Kansas students are beginning to look forward to next Saturday's contest with no little degree of excitement. This morning red ribbons bearing the words, "Rooters' Club," were distributed to several hundred students. Five hundred of these will be given out and for the wearers of the ribbons 500 seats will be reserved, forming a rooters' section to which only the leather lunged will be admitted.

The Jayhawker squad practiced until dark yesterday and today. The first team ran signals until it was impossible to see the ball on the forward passes and the men were forced to go in.

Kennedy is shifting his line-up a little. He believes that he will need a heavy team Saturday. He is getting as much weight in the line as is consistent. Carlson is being worked at center, while Jay Bond, who was just declared eligible yesterday, seems slated for a chance at left guard.

Kennedy is doing all in his power to strengthen the Kansas line. If the line can hold on punts, Forster will have no trouble in getting away his long kicks. However, if the Nebraska line is continually breaking through and making him rush his kicks, Forster's leg will not be nearly so effective. If he can take his time he can average forty-five or fifty yards on his punts and Kennedy is going to make the Kansas line so strong that Forster will have time to receive the ball, count the stitches in the leather and then kick it before any Nebraska man gets in the way.

It was with two field goals that Kansas defeated Nebraska last year. It is believed that with a line that can hold that either Forster can place kick or Porter can drop kick about as many goals as it is possible to try for—how many that will be will depend a great deal on the Kansas back field.
