The forecast of bad times ahead,

Wisconsin Enrollment.
This year has shown a large in-
crease in the enrollment of students
at the University of Wisconsin. An
increase of 30 per cent in the gradu-
ates studying at the college and also
in the freshmen enrolled is shown.
The total enrollment for the year will
be between 4,000 and 4,100. In the
College of Letters and Science there
are 1,638 students, which is an in-
crease of 180, or 11 per cent. There
are 492 freshmen in this college, an
increase of 120.
