Dr. Bessey has recently received a letter from Dr. John L. Sheldon, '99, in which he states that he has been made a full professor of botany at the University of West Virginia. Dr. this University in 1903 and was elected shortly after plant pathologist at the West Virginia experiment station. When here he was known as the tall man of Nebraska.

The Department of Botany has received a water photometer for use in measuring the intensity of light under water. It is very simple, working on essentially the same principle as the regular photometer. A piece of solio paper is arranged so that it can be exposed to the light when under water. In this way, when the length of exposure is known the intensity of the light can be told:

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
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
